BULLANT'S BANTER

2010 PGA Tour of Australia and One Asia Qualifying Scho

First Stage was held at Peninsula Golf Club South Course. Top 25 players and ties would qualify for the Final Stage of qualifying School. Leighton Lyle finished third with rounds of 70, 79, 72, 69.

The Final Stage was held at Peninsula Golf Club North Course. Leighton had rounds of 74, 81, 73, and 72, finishing outside the top 10. All 70 players in the final stage qualify for the Australian Tour, but only the top 10 qualify for One Asia.

On 16th January Jarrod Lyle played in Honolulu with rounds of 68, 65, 71 and 71 for a total of 275, made up of 15 birdies and 10 bogeys. Par for the course was 70. He finished in 34th place earning \$26,606.

On 16th January Leighton Lyle played in the 50th Victorian PGA with rounds of 70, 72, and 72, earning \$556.

FROM THE PAST

Richmond Golf Club, England, Temporary Rules, 1940

1. Players are asked to collect bomb and shrapnel splinters to save these causing damage to the mowing machines.
2. In competitions, during gunfire or while bombs are falling, players may take cover without penalty for ceasing play.
3. The positions of known delayed action bombs are marked by red flags at a reasonably but not guaranteed safe distance therefrom.
4. Shrapnel and/or bomb splinters on the fairways, or in bunkers, within a club's length of a ball, may be moved without penalty, and no penalty shall be incurred if a ball is thereby caused to move accidentally.
5. A ball moved by enemy action may be replaced, or if lost or destroyed, a ball may be dropped not nearer the hole without penalty.
6. A ball lying in a crater may be lifted and dropped not nearer the hole, preserving the line to the hole, without penalty.
7. A player whose stroke is affected my the simultaneous explosion of a bomb may play another ball from the same place. Penalty: one stroke.

FROM THE MATCH COMMITTEE

The Match Committee would like to encourage members to practice good golf etiquette.

In the case of slow play, if your group is a hole behind the group in front and cannot catch up, please allow the group behind to go through.

Bunker rakes should be placed in the centre of the bunker with the handle towards oncoming players.

Please ensure you repair divots and ball marks on greens (see next page).

At all times observe the rules of golf.

Remember that there is to be a maximum of 4 players in any playing group, at any time on the course.

Our dress requirements must be observed .

PITCH MARKS ON GREENS

With the unexpected deluge of rain recently causing softness to greens it's time once again to ensure they are kept in tip-top condition and we know Bill and his team always do a great job in course preparation. **HOWEVER**, due to depletion of his staff (illness) there are a couple of areas where we as players can assist greatly viz:-

Repairing pitch marks on greens.

Bi-monthly or so general working bees.

THEREFORE in order to become more pitch mark conscious, each green has been given a letter of the alphabet, and in some cases two or more. The green, which has the first letter of your surname beside it, is your green and we ask you to take responsibility for repairing as many pitch marks on that green as you can find. (Time permitting)
